

"We have been urging the council for two years to do something about trying to slow the traffic down in Sish Lane after the traffic calming measures in nearby roads.

We fear the next time it could be one of our children, many of whom saw this poor lady lying in the road when they came out of school."

To prevent disruption and possible confrontation during the protest the police decided to close off Sish Lane and divert traffic through Popple Way into Fairlands Way.



Woman dies in hit and run

POLICE launched a hunt for a hit and run driver after an elderly woman was knocked down and killed in Sish Lane, Stevenage, yesterday (Wednesday) afternoon.

The woman, believed in her 70s, was crossing the road with her dog – who was also killed – when the accident happened shortly after 3pm.

Officers say the woman, who died in Lister Hospital from head injuries, was struck by an R-registered, dark blue Peugeot 402 being driven at speed and erratically.

After hitting the woman, the driver of the Peugeot, who had been seen travelling through Stevenage Old Town at speed, turned right into Letchmore Road.

Anyone with information should contact the eastern area road policing unit on 01462 425055.

This notice appeared in the Stevenage Comet " on Thursday last. Long standing members of the Rainmakers are horrified to discover that the victim of this incident was Margery Heskins, a founder member of the club who danced with us, and sang for us, until a few years ago. She was the second club Chairman.

A congregation of well over three hundred people packed into Holy Trinity Church, Stevenage yesterday afternoon for the funeral of Margery Heskins. Amongst it were nine Rainmakers and one former Rainmaker. As Margeny and Harry had been members of the church for over thirty years it was a very personal service, led by three members of the Clergy and the church choir.

In her introduction the vicar mentioned all the charities for whom Margery had worked and the organisations to which she belonged. Representative from two choirs, the hytton Players, Martins Wood School where she helped children with special needs, the Rainmakers and of course Holy Trinity. Church where she ran a weekly tea bat and the Sunday morning creche, were all present. Many neighbours were there too. We all remembered Margery in different ways. The Vicar said that this very busy lady always had time for people especially those who dropped into the tea bar whom she sensed needed help.

The hymns were resoundingly sung by the choir and congregation, Music played before and after the service reflected Margery's love of classical music, I also detected familiar airs from Gilbert and Sullivan operattas and other stage shows in which she sang solos when a member of the Lytton Players,

Altogether it was a beautiful and very moving service.

The path through the churchyard to the

gate was lined with floral tributes including a wreath from the Rainmakers of red and yellow flowers. It reminded me of our Mexican dresses worn at a Hitchin Gathering when Margery sang for us and danced.

We feel great sympathy for Margery's husband, Harry, daughter Christine (who was also a Rainmaker for several years) son Neil and her

grand children.

From Jill's programme (which she often reminded us, had been chosen by us) you can see that we had an energetic evening. It was warm for the time of year and


there was much mopping of brows and sipping of punch. I'm sine Graham wished he had not decided to wear his Balkan costume that included a Sheepskin hat.

Hitand run tragedy

Comet. 10/10/02

THE MAN accused of killing an 82-year-old in a hit-and-run collision appeared before Stevenage magistrates yesterday.

Nadeem Younas, 24, of Norwich Close, Stevenage, stood locked in the dock with his pregnant wife Nacema, father-in-law Ghulan Janjua and brother Raja Naseem Younas.

All were sent to crown court to answer charges of conspiring to pervert the course of justice.

Pensioner

It is alleged that they provided Nadeem with a false alibi for September 18, the day that Marjorie Heskins died in Sish Lane, Stevenage.

The pensioner, of Pound Avenue, Stevenage was out walking her dog when she was hit by a Peugeot 406 while crossing the road.

By COURT REPORTER

Prosecuting, Charles White said that there was evidence to suggest that Nadeem Younas was behind the wheel.

He said that Younas would face charges of unlawful killing, causing death by dangerous driving, two counts of driving whilst disqualified, two counts of driving with no insurance, and failing to stop after an accident.

Mr White opposed bail for any of the four defendants and after hearing submissions from three defence lawyers magistrates adjourned to consider the arguments.

Mrs Younas, 24, who had sat with her head bowed, was close to tears as the chair of the bench announced that her husband would be remanded in custody with Raja Younnas, 28, also of Norwich Close, who is a senior IT consultant at Lister Hospital.

She was granted conditional bail with a surety of £10,000

and was ordered to surrender her passport to the court, not to contact directly or indirectly her next door neighbour Mr Charlton, who is a witness in the trial.

She was ordered to report to Stevenage Police Station on Mondays, Wednesdays and Saturdays.

Travel

A £10,000 surety was also given for Janjua's conditional bail. The 47-year-old, of Tooting, has recently been granted asylum in the UK and was ordered not to apply for travel documents to leave the country.

All four defendants will appear at Luton Crown Court on Tuesday, October 15, at 10am.

Road safety campaigners from Sish Lane and Fairlands Primary School will meet on the same evening, at 7pm.

John Hayes, headteacher of Fairlands Primary School, will chair the meeting. Guests include Stevenage Borough councillors and police officers.

All residents and parents are welcome to attend.

● Police were called to Letchmore Road, Stevenage, during the rush hour last night after a car went out of control, hit a parked vehicle and rolled on its side before coming to rest against a house. Nobody was hurt in the incident.

IN THE BEGINNING (Late 1976 or early 1977)

JILL PUT UP A NOTICE AT STAPLERS ASKING FOR MUSICIANS TO PLAY INTERNATIONAL MUSIC FOR THE RAINMAKERS, FOUNDED IN SEPTEMBER 1976.

Jill Bransby (Banjo and Guitar), Hazel Glass (Violin), Tony Glenn (Guitar), Clive Gumbrill (Accordion), Ces Mills (Guitar and Recorder) formed the first Cloudburst line-up, although Tony and Jill probably didn't play together. Tony played for the International while Jill danced or called.

Very soon after the group started playing Tony was asked to call an English Barn Dance so we discovered, after several subsequent bookings, that we could actually earn some money playing folk music (Astounding!).

Over the years we played for other English callers – Bernard Higgs, Mark Palmer, Pat Gray, Alan Gibson, Mark Elvins (probably still in short trousers and he couldn't spell 'OXO'!), Peter Shea, Barry and Stephanie Pywell, John Stoakes, Malcolm Cox, Adrian Bezzant, Paddy O'Neill, Guy Henley, John Riley, Jim Coomber, Brian Limbrick, Terry Reid, Terry Elvins, Jean and Mervyn Fortune, Bob Ridout, Brenda Godrich, Mary Rutherford and the most long suffering, Keith Harrup.

How we met Martin Butler.

We were playing at the Ampthill dance club when Martin came over and introduced himself saying said that he played a particular tune in a different way. (No change there then!) We later invited him to play at the Icknield Wayfarers Dance Club where he knocked over Jill's drink and drunk the next one. Clive had wisely gone off to University by this time. The legacy that Clive left us is the 'land speed' record for *The Irish Washerwoman* and the band boards that we are still using.

The very talented Katherine Barnett joined us with her accordion but it wasn't fair because she was a proper musician. More proper musicians followed Adrian Boddy (Violin), Matthew Compton (Violin and Viola, also starting to play an electric/eccentric keyboard), who went off to get even more trained and finally joined the BBC Philharmonic – a poor second we thought! More clever Comptons followed - Celia (Oboe and Recorder) and later Eleanor (Double Bass). Dick Bland played Clarinet for many years until his illness prevented him from playing with us. We always hope he will rejoin us one day (Adrian did after a 16 year gap). Other musicians are Dave Stacey (Banjo and Guitar) 'Banjo man' (has beard and does tricks with his banjo) as opposed to 'Banjo woman' (who hasn't and doesn't). Dave Rutherford (Drums) is a useful member, not just for his playing but because drummers deflect all the banjo jokes.

Wendy Harrup used to come along with Keith to gigs but she liked to sing and dance, she occasionally joined us with her fiddle. However, eventually she got better and better at the fiddle becoming an accomplished International music player and joined the SIFD Band. Martin and Hazel followed and Martin now leads the SIFD Band every month at Cecil Sharp House (Fame!)

Lots of musicians have played with Cloudburst, sometimes for special sessions or for a while. These have included springoffs from the main band, such as Hilda and Fraser Bransby, Helen Glass, Elizabeth Rutherford, Eleanor Butler. Other musicians to have survived the experience are Mike Gilbert, Liz Baldry, Jim Schwabe, Maureen Hamon, Heather Payne, Derek Boothsby, Alan Hughes, Barbara Burton, Karen Ackroyd (Who painted her fiddle mauve and joined a pop group), Narendra Kotiyan (who must take the accolade for playing so many different instruments well) and Anne Leach. The latter two have added an extra musical dimension at the Eastbourne International Festival where Cloudburst have played 6 times.

We have played at village and town halls, on tractor-trailers in barns, in pubs (including a 'residency' at the *Live and Let Live*), in school halls, in hospitals, in a police station, in marquees, in stately homes. We have played for weddings, anniversaries, birthdays and festivals, for Badminton and Bowls Clubs, for PTAs, for the Police and even the Conservatives. We have played for many different Dance Clubs, including *The Society For International Folk Dancing* (SIFD). International callers Jill Bransby, Joan and Simon Guest, Fiona Howarth, Jeanette Hull, Julie Korth, Anne Leach, Maggie O'Reagan, Pam Radford, have worked with *Cloudburst* for International dances in London and at the Eastbourne Festival.

On the International side Martin has worked so hard listening to tapes and putting the sounds into music even learning the dances so he can get the correct feel to the tune. He has played for *The Rainmakers* at Bingen, when he was supported by many members of *Jacobs Ladder*, at lots and lots of *Hitchin Gatherings* and at countless social functions giving *The Rainmakers* so much pleasure.

We have survived 25 years of 'playing together' (well occasionally we are in time!) and are still having a lot of fun! CONGRATULATIONS to all who have played or called with *Cloudburst*.

Minutes of Annual General Meeting held at St Michael's Church Hall, Letchworth. Friday 23rd November 2001

The meeting opened at 08.05pm with Graham Styles in the Chair.

1 Opening Welcome

Graham opened the proceedings by welcoming everybody to the meeting and drew attention to the following points:-

- a) The meeting was being recorded and requested members to prefix any comments with their name.
- b) To record their presence on the clipboard being circulated.
- c) That members of less than 3 months standing were not eligible to vote.

Number of members Present 20

Graham advised the meeting that an attendance of 20 members exceeded the constitutional requirement of 25% attendance of total membership (Ref Para 4.g) and declared the AGM valid.

3 Minutes of Annual General Meeting of Friday 24th November 2000

Graham requested members to raise points of inaccuracy in the minutes of the previous years AGM held on Friday 24th November 2000.

Members raised no points of inaccuracy.

Graham offered the minutes for acceptance as a true and accurate record of the clubs 2000 AGM. Proposed by Louise seconded by Phil. Carried with no objections & one abstention. Graham signed the minutes.

4 Matters Arising

Using prepared notes Graham addressed the following matters arising from the 2000 AGM:-

4.1 Ref AGM Minutes Para 6.1 Capital Outlay on Audio Equipment

Graham reported that committee had decided to defer any decision on overhauling the club's current Coomber. Instead, committee felt that it would be more beneficial to investigate the possibility of obtaining a donation from local fund holders to purchase a new unit. Possibly one including Mini-Disk or Compact-Disk technology. Graham advised new committee to consider carefully the proven reliability and flexibility of cassette tape, together with the investment the club has already made in this medium. Noting that the apparent advantages offered by newer technology may not be realised in a club environment.

4.2 Ref AGM minutes Para 6.2 Sale of club costume.

During the year, some items of surplus club costume were sold, although a number of pieces still remain. Graham recommended new committee progress this as a low priority task.

4.3 Ref AGM Minutes Para 6.3 Short audiotapes.

Graham reported that although a small number of notations still needed to be located, the 30 new cassettes (60 tunes) had been successfully introduced into general use. He recommended this item be regarded as closed.

4.4 Ref AGM Minutes Para 6.8 Anniversary T-Shirt.

Graham noted that the exercise of producing a T-Shirt to commemorate Rainmakers 25th Anniversary has been brought to a satisfactory conclusion, with many members regularly wearing them on a Friday evening. The club presented a complementary T-Shirt to Jill in recognition of her unstinting work over the years.

4.5 Ref AGM Minutes Para 6.9 Anniversary dance 2001.

Graham report that the club's Silver Jubilee Dance did take place in Ickleford Village hall on 13th October as proposed. With Jill acting as MC, members danced to live music from Cloudburst and recorded music on tape. Members of the Irish Set Dance Workshop and Davila Heath provided cabaret spots. Responding to Betty's letters of invitation, past members Terry & Patricia Reid & Roy Bowtell attended the dance. Maria produced an anniversary cake, which together with member's donations of food provided a more than ample buffet. At the end of the evening, many dancers said they had enjoyed the event. Your committee regarded the evening as a success even though it did incur a small excess of expenditure over income.

4.6 Ref AGM Minutes Para 11.4 Bring a friend Evening.

Graham informed the meeting that two "Bring a Friend" Evenings had taken place since the last AGM. The second one attracting several faces new to Rainmakers.

4.7 Ref AGM Minutes Para 12 Letchworth Centenary Celebrations 2003

Graham reported that since the last AGM, the Heritage Foundation has held one further meeting for members of Letchworth based clubs and societies. Although the foundation is actively promoting the event with offers of assistance for groups with similar interests backed up with an offer of "funding". Graham noted that in reality many smaller clubs would be expected to "do their own thing" when it comes to arranging a joint event. Adrian has agreed to attend any further meetings as Rainmakers representative.

4.8 Ref AGM Minutes Para 14.3 Newsletter,

Graham informed the meeting that following Mark's suggestion, committee had instigated a quarterly Diary Date Sheet. To date two issues have been produced. From his position as Chairman, Graham stated that he regarded the date sheet as a benefit to club members and committee alike. He recommended that new committee make every effort to continue its publication.

Graham asked if there were any questions or points members felt he had overlooked. There were none.

5 Secretary's Report

Sheila presented a report covering club activities for the period 1st September 2000 to 31st August 2001.

A full transcript of Sheila's report is available.

Graham thanked Sheila for her comprehensive report.

6 Treasurer's Report

Commenting that copies of the club accounts had been circulated well in advance of the AGM, Richard immediately invited questions from the floor.

There being no questions, Graham offered the accounts for acceptance.

Alan proposed their acceptance, seconded by Betty. There were no objections or abstentions.

7 Annual Subs & Weekly Charges Subs

Graham advised the meeting that in conjunction with the accounts Richard had presented a comprehensive budget for the next 12 months, including proposals regarding the annual subs & weekly charges. After due deliberation in committee Graham stated that he was now in a position to recommended the following proposals on behalf of committee:-

- a) Annual subscriptions be unchanged at £3.
- b) Weekly charges be raised from £1 to £1.30.

In response to a question from Alan, Richard confirmed that his budget calculations were based on the policy of Friday Evenings being "self sufficient".

There being no other questions Graham offered the proposals for acceptance. Phil proposed their acceptance, seconded by Dick. There were no objections or abstentions. Graham confirmed that the revised weekly charges will become effective from 1st January 2002.

8 Appointment of Independent Examiner

Richard informed the meeting that Bill Thorn was willing to accept the position of independent examiner. Proposed by Adrian, seconded by Richard. There were no objections or abstentions. Richard noted that if unforeseen circumstances took Bill out of the area, he had a "fall back" plan he could bring into action.

Jill proposed a vote of thanks be passed to Bill. Richard replied that he had already done so

9 Chairman's Comments

9.1 Graham opened his comments by noting that, when compiling a list of members who had supported the club with practical contributions over the last 12 months, he very nearly ended up with a copy of the membership list. Consequently with the meetings indulgence he would précis his thanks as follows:-

To Jill, as dance teacher and general font of good ideas and information. Also as overall organiser of the Irish dance workshop. Graham took the opportunity to congratulate Jill for finally being recognised as a dance teacher by the SIFD.

Chairman's Comments (Continued)

Graham thanked all those members who had acted as Friday MC's.

Graham thanked his committee, praising their conscientious teamwork during the year and expressed a sincere wish that the new Chairman would be as fortunate with his, or her, new committee.

Graham concluded by thanking all non-committee members who have undertaken the wide range of activities vital to the development and smooth running of the club.

9.2 General Comments

Graham stated that Committee has met seven times since the last AGM and that as it's Chairman it had been his overriding intention, through committee, to maintain the level and variety of Rainmakers activities at a level to which the club had become accustomed.

9.3 Displays

Graham expressed the belief that most members were well aware of his views regarding the benefits to be gained from display activities. Referring to Sheila's report he was therefore delighted to confirm that the club had ventured out to display on two occasions last year. He recommended that new committee take a considered yet positive approach to further displays.

9.4 Workshops

In view of their success Graham recommend that committee continues to arrange occasional special Friday evening workshops with invited teachers during the next year and also to provide at least one full Saturday workshop. Following the now well established and successful format used in previous years.

9.5 Conclusion

Graham reported that his decision not to stand for re-election had been a relatively easy one. He had served on Rainmakers committee for 10 years, including 4 years as its Chairman. He expressed his pleasure at holding that office as the club moved into a new millennium and also as it reached and celebrated its Silver Jubilee. Stating that, for him, being chairman of a club with such a welcoming and enthusiastic attitude did carry a large measure of kudos. However, he felt that now was the time to stand down and make way for someone with a new approach and some innovative ideas. Graham thanked members for their support during his time as Chairman

Graham concluded his comments by thanking members for their attention.

Consequently it would be impossible for the club to transact any financial business, as access its bank accounts required the signatures of any two of the three officers (i.e. Chairman, Treasurer & Secretary). During the discussions that ensued Peter Bransby offered to stand as Secretary and Katka offered to stand as a committee member. Both were duly proposed & seconded.

At this point Graham read out the list of nominations for committee (See Para 13.2) and asked if there were any further nominations from the floor. There were none

Graham asked if there were any objection to electing new committee "on block". There were no objections.

Maori Cultural Shows in New Zealand

In November and December Peter and I went on a retirement trip, primarily to New Zealand. We managed to see three fascinating Maori shows when we were in the North Island.

The first was at Waitangi, North of Auckland, in the Bay of Islands area. This area is of great significance historically since it was here that the first English settlement was founded and where The Treaty of Waitangi was signed, by 46 Maori chiefs and representatives of Queen Victoria's government. This treaty, dealing with land rights, was, in its time (1840), quite advanced and the issues are still strongly debated. The tribe, *Ngapuhi*, that performed the two-hour show at Waitangi were the first tribe to sign this treaty and their songs reflected this historical experience as if it was yesterday.

When we arrived we were asked to wait outside the Meeting House (Whare hui) in order that The Challenge (Te Wero) could be performed. Since Peter and I were the only audience, Peter had to be the 'chief' who had to pond to the terrifying challenge issued by a warrior moved in an intimidating fashion and wielded a long spear (Taiaha). The warrior threw down a leaf (peace offering) which Peter had to pick up and place on the ground in front of him, signalling that we came in peace. We then were welcomed inside and given a traditional greeting of speeches and singing. We then touched noses (hongi) with all the tribe, about 14 men, women and children. This, we were told, was 'breathing life' and sealed bonds of friendship between us.

The show included many well-sung songs, with actions.



Some I can remember were about herons, also mythological birds, the tribe's arrival by canoe from Polynesia (The Great Migration), Captain Cook's arrival and the proposed building of a prison on sacred ground where there were hot springs. The songs and the chants are a way of recording Maori history, which traditionally wasn't recorded as written history.

The men and boys performed *Haka* and the warrior, who had earlier challenged Peter, showed his extraordinary skills in weaponry (photo). The women swung the short *poi* (balls on lengths of flax string) during some of the songs and Peter and I, and some of their children, were later invited to join in. As you

can imagine we leapt up at the opportunity and twirled away. We learned that the *poi* were originally used by the men to develop their wrist flexibility for spear wielding in war activities and rituals, and that the women had now incorporated the movement in their songs.

I haven't mentioned costumes as these were not much in evidence. The women had European skirts and blouses and the men had short 'skirts' that I think were mostly

made of hessian rather than stranded flax. I suspect this was because the show was very new - I wasn't able to discover whether the group had performed together before. The leader was marshalling his dancers and singers as they were performing and the rest of the tribe hadn't seen the war skills performed before.

The show ended with speeches and Peter gave what he hoped was an appropriate speech about us coming to New Zealand to learn about the people and their culture. We were told that although

there were only two of us watching, all our ancestors were there, as were theirs. Afterwards when we were chatting informally (being female I wouldn't be allowed to give speeches during the ceremony) I told them about the SIFD and how I would write an article so that more people could learn about the show. What this concert lacked in precision it made up in warmth and enthusiasm that conveyed a very strong sense of pride in their culture. It was wonderful to see the children learning the movements and the language.

The second show at Rotorua was such a different cultural experience. We were taken by coach to Tamaki Maori Village for an evening show and meal (Hangi). Peter was once again chosen to be the chief representing the people on our coach. I don't know how many coach loads of people arrived but a great many. Outside of the fortified village The Challenge was offered again and one of the visiting chiefs picked up the peace offering (Teka). We then entered the village to watch the people showing different activities such as weaponry displays, hand games, poi twirling and chanting. We were then invited into The Big House (Wharenui) where the women were not allowed to sit in the front row. (This is so that if fighting should break out the men should be the protectors - what it actually meant was that I had some big heads in the way of my photos!). After the welcoming speeches and songs, our one representative (not Peter this time) performed the hongi.

The show was very slick and the women were extremely dextrous when they performed with the long and the short *poi*. They also performed stick dances (not with rolled up copies of *The Radio Times*!) with great accura-

cy, hurling them from one side of the stage to another. They didn't perform 'our' dance – probably too simple. (I asked the *Ngapuhi* at Waitangi if they knew our dance, I sang the song, but the leader said that it came from a different area so they didn't perform it.)

The women wore long black costumes, with tunic tops, head bands and *Moko* (tattoo) on their chins. The men's faces were decorated with elaborate tatoos. (Whether this was face paint or genuine tattos I do not know, I suspect the former.) We learned more about 'traditional' costume at the next show but to continue my account at Tamaki....




Costumes at Tamaki

After the show we had an excellent meal – the traditional *Hangi*. The food in baskets was traditionally cooked on hot rocks for three to four hours. Over the baskets wet cloths and hessian were placed and then earth was placed on top. We were shown how this was done outside the dining room in the village but nowadays the food is cooked in the kitchen that we weren't allowed to enter (familiar story?). I remember having sweet potatoes and a very good steamed pudding.

The coach drivers took part in the closing ceremony that included Haka – they really enjoyed that! On the return coach ride, our driver coerced different people on the coach to sing national songs. His idea of an English song was 'I've got a Loveerly Bunch of Coconuts' and he performed 'I'll be Coming Round the Mountain' (American song) whilst driving round a roundabout four times just outside Rotorua. When we travelled to the village earlier we were asked to do paddling movements in the aisle to get our waka (canoe) along. If members go to this show I would advise you to drive yourselves there!

The next day we went to **Whakarewarewa**, which is a thermal park, but also a Maori cultural area. The show there was much shorter, although with all the same key elements of the others we had seen. Here we took off our shoes before entering the Meeting House but I was

allowed to sit in the front row this time and I am pleased to relate that no fighting broke out! The dancing was very well performed and I especially enjoyed their stick dancing which was carried out by groups of four sitting on the floor and exchanging all four sticks simultaneously. At the beginning and end of the dance the sticks we cleverly thrown across and then forward or backwards, in time to the music until all the sticks were either on or off the stage – better than getting them in and out of a plastic bag! The men and women wore the *piupiu*. The women's moved attractively when they swung the poi (see front cover), swaying from side to side as they sang. (By the way all the shows included guitars - non-traditional instruments.)

After the show we went on part of a tour which started in the Maori Arts and Crafts centre at Whaka (which it is also called). We were shown how the flax leaves were cut and made into string and also how strips of leaves are rolled into narrow lengths to make the strands of the skirts. (The flax plant is very large, and can be seen virtually everywhere you travel in New Zealand. It was flowering when we were there - huge red flowers that looked like those of a gladiolus.) The skirts have to been worn with under garments - not just for modesty's sake but because they are very rough on the skin. The flax plant itself can cause you nasty cuts. The Maori guide explained that the flax skirts were not traditional garments but had been developed for the shows. (Flax or feather cloaks were part of traditional dress.) In a photo we saw of the Duke and Duchess of York (the late Queen Mother) visiting New Zealand in (I think) the 1920s, the Maori women with them were wearing long flax skirts. There were more of the traditional crafts to be seen at Whaka basketwork, bone, wood and jade carving, and wall and ceiling paintings (These can be seen on the rafters of the meeting house in the photo on the front cover).

All three shows were fascinating in their own right and gave us a little insight into this extraordinarily rich culture. I came away wanting to learn so much more but I suppose that is the reason we travel. Then we went to Japan......



- Five years for hit-and-run driver-



A DRIVER who killed a pensioner and then persuaded family members to cover up for his crime has been jailed for five years.

Nadeem Younas, 24, had been halfway through a two-year drink-driving ban when he mowed down 82-year-old Marjorie Heskins, in Sish Lane, Stevenage, last year.

Dangerous

Younas, of Norwich Close, Stevenage, was estimated to be driving at twice the legal 30mph limit at the time of the accident, in September.

On Monday, at Luton Crown Court, he was given four years for

causing death by dangerous driving, driving while disqualified, failing to stop at the scene of an accident and driving with no insurance.

He was also given a further 12 months for conspiring to pervert the course of justice and has been disqualified from driving for 10 years. He will need to retake his driving test before being allowed back on the road.

Sentencing 'Younas, Judge Ronald Moss said: "This driving was unbelievably reckless. You were disqualified and should not have been driving and you failed to stop when you must have

realised the damage you had done."

Younas, who pleaded guilty to all the charges, was accompanied in the dock by his pregnant wife Naeema, 24, brother Raja Younas, 28, both of Norwich Close, and father-in-law Ghulam Janjua, of Tooting.

Conspiring

All three also pleaded guilty to conspiring to pervert the course of justice after providing Younas with false alibis.

They have not yet been sentenced but have been told to expect to be put in jail.



A British interview with Michael Jackson has been sold by Granada Television to ABC in New York for £3.5 million.

Hit and run Cover-up: two jailed

THE WIFE of a man who mowed down and killed a Stevenage pensioner has been spared a jail term for covering up for her husband, because of "exceptional" circumstances.

But two other members of the same family have been given prison sentences for their part in cooking up a story to protect 24-year-old Nadeem Younas.

Younas, of Norwich Close, was jailed for five years in January for plough-

ing into 82-year-old Marjorie Heskins in Sish Lane last September.

Last week his wife Naeema, also 24, his brother Raja Younas, 28, and father-in-law Ghulam Janjua, 48, all appeared at Luton Crown Court for sentencing after pleading guilty to perverting the course of justice.

Nacema, who was pregnant at the time of the incident but who is now the mother of one-month-old son, was given a nine-month prison sentence, suspended for two years.

Exceptional

Judge Ronald Moss said her case was "exceptional" both because of the recent birth and also the cultural pressures on her to support her husband.

Raja Younas, also of Norwich Close, was jailed for 15 months on Wednesday. Judge Moss told him: "You persisted in your lies to try and cover up for your brother's wrongdoing. You should have said no when he asked for your help."

Janjua, from Bromley, Kent, was given a 12-month sentence on Thursday.

Judge Moss told him: "It was your daughter who asked for your help and your duty should have been to dissuade her from what she was doing. But you were the first of the three to tell the truth, albeit some weeks later."

During the incident, on September 18 last year, a member of the public jotted down the number plate of the car as it sped away from the crash.

But when police traced the vehicle to the home of Younas, his brother claimed it had been stolen from their locked garage. Then his wife told police that

Then his wife told police that Nadeem had been in London with her father seeking advice on their marriage problems.

Police contacted her father who confirmed the story and all three made written statements to the police, said prosecutor Antionette Mackeson, and continued with their lies until police received other information.

Judge Moss said that police had been hindered in their investigations for about three weeks, and but for their "tenacity" the true culprit could have gone undetected.

Martin Lahiffe, defending Naeema, said: "Her husband was the instigator of the lies and she went along with them out of a mixture of loyalty and cultural pressure not to go against her husband. His sense of panic enveloped his wife.

"If she goes to prison today, her baby will have to go with her."

Dismissed

Piers Reed, defending Raja, said: "He has lost everything as a result of this. He was dismissed from his £32,000 a year job with the NHS at a time when he had just gained promotion to running the IT unit in a large Birmingham hospital.

"Clearly he was on the way up. He has been brought crashing down as a result of his brother's stupidity and folly."

Following the sentencing, deputy senior investigating officer on the case Sgt Dick Light said: "This was an appalling act of criminality which has caused great sadness to the family and friends of Mrs Heskins."





Renovations for the

Centenary Celebrations

in the world's first garden city.

Broadway Gardens, owned by the Letchworth Garden City Heritage Foundation and leased to North Hertfordshire District Council, are right at the heart of Letchworth Garden City.

What better place to celebrate the town's 100th anniversary ...

During the 1990s it became apparent that some of the Poplars in the then Kennedy Gardens were in a poor condition and would need to be replaced. Consultants, Landscape Design Associates (LDA), were appointed to help the council develop a restoration scheme that would attract funding from the Heritage Lottery Fund. The extent of the necessary tree replacement became clear when a consultant tree specialist reported that:

- the Poplars should all be removed as they had reached the end of their natural life and some were unsafe.
- many of the Beeches and Cedars were originally planted too close together and had structural weaknesses. So these too should all be removed.

- the Oak Trees, of considerable historic importance and in good condition, should be retained.
- in Broadway Walk, the Silver Maples were of poor quality; and the Plane trees would grow too large.

A high quality, imaginative scheme was developed by LDA and in March 2002 the Heritage Lottery Fund announced its agreement to funding 65% of the renovation costs.

The renovation scheme

The renovation scheme to Broadway Gardens and Broadway Walk is based on the original masterplan for the area, designed by one of the town's first architects, Raymond Unwin. This masterplan is etched on a plaque now mounted in the paved events area in the Gardens.

The new trees in Broadway Gardens are Tilia euchlora – a type of lime that does not have the aphid problems normally associated with lime. Liquidamber trees have been planted in Broadway Walk.

Box hedging has been planted all along Broadway Walk, while hornbeam circles Broadway Gardens and Broadway Walk.

Around 30 beds have been stocked with over 3,500 plants and 4,500 bulbs, including, in the east and west entrances to the Gardens, a special Centenary Rose, bred and donated by Harkness Roses.

A spectacular new fountain now stands at the southern end of the Gardens, to greet visitors entering the town centre from the Hitchin-Baldock Road.

There are two pergolas dedicated to the town's first architects. Each pergola contains a floor mounted plaque, one picturing Barry Parker, the other Raymond Unwin.

A plaque to commemorate the founder of the Garden City Movement, Ebenezer Howard, has been set in a granite drum at the station end of Broadway. The "three magnets" diagram on this plaque was used to describe the principles of Garden City Movement.

The memorial stone to the late President of the United States of America, John F Kennedy, has been cleaned and re-mounted. This enduring memorial now stands close to the site it first occupied following the president's assassination in 1963.

The new seating in Broadway Gardens and Broadway Walk has been specially designed to match the original specifications for seating in the earliest days of Letchworth Garden City.

The renovations to Broadway Gardens and Broadway Walk have cost a total of £1.27m.

This has been funded by:

- £820,000 the National Heritage Lottery Fund,
- £330,000 North Hertfordshire District Council,
- ◆ £89,500 Letchworth Garden
 City Heritage Foundation,
- £32,000 Morrison's when they built their adjacent store, and
- £8,000 Hertfordshire County Council for traffic calming improvements.



Friday, June 13th 2003. Swedish Dancing.



Rainmakers Display at Berden Hall, Berden. 12th July 2003

The village of Berden lies between Buntingford and Bishop's Stortford, just over the county boundary in Essex.
