	Peter reported that nominations, properly seconded, had been received as follows: Chairman Peter, Treasurer Richard, Committee: Belinda, Julie, and Roger. He invited further nominations, but none was forthcoming. Richard expressed his longstanding concern about workload on such a small committee, and Peter commented that the committee had been very effective over the last year. Katka offered to continue, from outside the committee, to arrange reserve Friday callers. Isabel proposed, and Katka seconded, that all those nominated should be elected <i>en bloc</i> , and that the Committee should appoint one or more of its members to carry out the functions of Secretary. The motion was approved unanimously. Richard asked that the meeting approve Belinda as a cheque signatory to replace Adrian. This was agreed.	
9	Any other business	
9.1	Cliff Beck Peter reported that Roy Clarke had offered to bring Cliff to Rainmakers to play his accordion next week. Would the club welcome him coming, and would there be enough people present to make it worthwhile for him? Cliff specialised in the older German and Austrian repertoire and Jill felt the club would enjoy having him. Live music added to the evening and it was agreed that we would be pleased to see Cliff.	
9.2	Recruitment Peter raised this item as the major issue facing the club. He reported the actions taken by the committee and noted that some 8 newcomers had attended the beginners evenings in September. But we seemed to have perhaps only one long term recruit. We now had a web site and the Appalachian Cloggers were demonstrating at the Christmas party. We publicised our activities regularly to other dance clubs.	
1	Graham said that all other dance clubs were facing the same difficulty, though Claire reported that Letchworth Scottish dance group were growing. They were welcoming and patient with new members and the programme would be changed at short notice – both done at Rainmakers.	
	The new committee would action publicity in the Comet, Spotlight (though we need to have suitable special events), and libraries. It was suggested we should ask other dance clubs to special evenings, though this had not been especially successful in the past. Another approach was to offer demonstrations to dances run by others. Report on the Rainmakers Bear. November 2004 - 2005.

On looking back over the Rainmakers' events of the past year I am inclined to call it "The "Jear of Innovations." Our very hard working committee arranged some different happenings" for us. Other innovations happened by force

of circumstances.

The first unusual club evening was on December 3rd 2004. Roy Clark of the S.I.F.D. (by arrangement with Jill) brought Cliff Beck to Rainmakers. Cliff used to play in the first S.I.F.D. Band. He had expressed a wish to play for dancing again so he brought his accordion and played the dances popular in the 1970 s at the S.I.F.D. such as Hammersmiths and Tanguj. Most of these were familiar to to the long standing club members but were totally new to others.

On entering the room for our Christmas Party on December 17th it seemed to be full of people. This was because the Weston Appalachian Cloggers had been invited and they had come with their families. It was a good thing the Play School. had recently moved out with all their equipment. This gave us more room. Led by Kerry Fletcher over visitors entertained us with two spots of Appalachian clog dancing. They were accompanied by their own excellent fiddler. It was very pleasing to see two Rainmakers, Maria and Belinda in starring roles. The eloggers enjoyed dancing to Cloudburst Band

who played easily followable dances.

Still in party mood eleven Rainmakers gave a display at Roy Bowtell and Sandra Welch's party at Ickleford on December 28th.

The new term began on January 7th. January 14th and 21st were designated as Beginners' Nights. I can't remember whether

any new people actually appeared.

A real innovation was the holding of three free World Dance workshops on 31st March, 7th and 14th April at the new Letchworth Lawn Tennis Club, taught by Jill. Peter had persuaded North Herts Collège to back them as part of their Festival of Learning and to publicise the new tennis club. We hoped to gain some new members. All three sessions were well attended and much enjoyed.

On 16th April, hosted by Till and Peter, Frank Dowling came all the way from the Newcastle area to teach a Day Course of Eastern European Dances. Thirty people attended. They much enjoyed the day.

The Eastbourne International Festival, 29th April to 2nd May, was said to be different this year. Claire, aided by her husband Geoff, manned her stall and raised a lot of money for the S.I.F.D. Till and Peter were free to experience various work-shops and dances as they were not involved in the organisation this year.

A completely new idea was implemented on Friday, 13th May, when Tulie booked a long table at an Italian restaurant in Letchworth

for us to socialise and have a meal before going to dance in the Parish Hall. Ten people decided to experiment. The food was good but conversation was almost impossible because of the din made by several parties of young women on Hen Nights. The idea was a good one. We thanked Julie for her efforts and said we would try again sometime in the future.

The eight Rainmakers, including Martin Butler of Cloudburst Band, who went to Baldock Street Fair on May 21st to give dancing displays, will not forget the occasion in a hurry. It was a really wet day. The pictures in the Scrapbook say it all. Will Baldock invite the

Rainmakers ever again?!

For years we have seen the name of Wigginton Club in the S. I. F. D. Newsletter, but have never met our neighbours. The committee invited them to our club evening on 10th Tune. Eight ladies came. They have not men in their club. We danced dances they knew plus some others that are easy to follow. It was a very friendly occasion. Julie served scenes, cream and strawberries in the interval, A Wigginton lady remarked "We do not have lucious refreshments like this." Our reply was "Nor do we on a normal night."

On Thursday 30th June our club was invited to Wigginton to join in a workshop to be tought by Janet Woolbar. The village is at the end of the Ridgeway near Tring and is not easy to find. Six Rainmakers went along and were given a warm welcome by the Wigginton club members.

A visit to the International Eisteddfod at Llangollen held Tuly 5th—10th, had become a regular part of the folk dancing year for some Rainmakers, but only Jill and Claire were able to go this year. Far fewer teams than usual entered the dancing competitions because of the difficulty of getting visus to enter Britain.

The highlight of the Summer was Till and Peter's Ruby Wedding celebration held. on 23rd July at Ickleford. It was a wonderful dance party that went with a swing. We were very amused by a speech made to the happy couple by Daksha. It consisted of a clever parody of Part of the Christian marriage service, quotations from Croethe, Lord Byron, Duoty Springfield and Helen

Shapiro.
The Italian Fackel Tanz was revived. It gave a magical effect as sixteen dancers circled the

room holding lighted candles.

Fortunately the power for the band was not cut off as we danced on past the finishing time. The cries of "Sh! Sh!" must have been effective. The following Thursday, July 28th eight of us went to Victoria Court, a sattelite of the Lister

Hospital where Sue Barter is now living. It was a Very hot day. The residents, seated in large

Chairs, were crowded into a small Common Room. We wore bright costumes and did our best to give them a lively entertainment. Around the room there were some hodding heads and tapping feet indicating that the music was being enjoyed. Sue did not know us but to our amazement, when encouraged by her daughters, she stood up and remembered the steps of an Israeli dance.

We came away feeling greatly saddened but knowing that our visit had been well worthwhile.

The next day, Friday 29th Tuly, was the first of two Garden Evenings. Fight of us had a very peaceful, sociable time at Claire and Geoff's home in Letchworth. The group being small we could actually all sit in a room (after it became too dark to dance in the garden) and join in the same conversation.

Peter and Till welcomed us to their home in Hitchin the next Friday, 5th of August. A few more people were present than on the previous week but in nothing like the numbers who used to appear at Garden Evenings in years past. Nevertheless those present had an equally

enjoyable evening.

During August we heard the sad news that Gordon Stacey had died. Gordon was one

of the founder members of our club.

Rainmakers having enjoyed their holidays in various far flung places from Towersey, near Aylesbury to Tulie's trip on the Trans Siberian Railway taking in stops on the way, were glad to meet again in the Parish Hall on 2nd September.

Beginners Nights were advertised for the 16th and 23rd September. Some new people came. What an innovation! And two have stayed with us.

The next venture was to a Chinese restaurant in Letchworth for a meal on 30 th September. This was a great success. The ten people who partook liked the restaurant, liked the food and liked the ambience. It was quiet, Then we went on to dance.

Dur 29th Anniversary Dance was held on 21 st October at the Central Methodist Church Hall in Letchworth. Yes, another innovation one forced upon us when Peter was told, at very short notice, that St. Michael's would not be available for us because of problems with the floor. Peter and Till had a busy time making new arrangements.

We had a very enjoyable evening—all ten Rainmakers phis four visitors. Where were all the other Rainmakers? Not celebrating odr 29th

anniversary, obviously,

Peter has been asking us how we would like to celebrate our 30th anniversary next year. Will we still have a Rainmakers club then if numbers attending events do not increase?

On Saturday 19th November Roberto Haddon came to St. Michael's to lead a Day Course of Israeli dancing. He is a very highly regarded, propular dancing teacher and we were lucky to get him. My Rainmakers 1976 - 2006

Foundation. Rainmakers started when Jill Bransby moved to Letchworth in 1976 and met Roy and Renee Bowtell and Gordon and Dalphine Stacey. The five founder members launched Rainmakers on 10 September 1976 in Stevenage. Mayim Mayim was an early and popular dance, which coincided with the breaking of the long drought of that hot summer - the name of the group chose itself. Also notable was the formation of the band Cloudburst in 1977.

Regular activities. The group has met every Friday, apart from in August, at Christmas and on Good Friday, since 1976, with Jill teaching the vast majority of evenings. The group has taken part in some 150 displays and demonstrations, including the regular display at the Hitchin Gathering each March – a real stimul to improving our dance skills. Another stimulus has been the excellent day courses by SIFD teachers. These, together with other sources, mean that Rainmakers have learnt 512 dances, from four continents.

Structure. Rainmakers has always been a members' club, run by an elected committee. Five chairmen have served after Jill's initial 13 year term. The club has developed a strong tradition that all members help, so the committee, while necessarily hard working, gets much support. The club is financially self supporting and charges modest fees – an encouragement to the new members we always look for.

Highlights. There have been many highlights, including the riot that broke out when some drunken youths gate crashed a dance Rainmakers were leading in Hemel Hempstead in 1989. But most memorable was the near appearance of Rainmakers on the Barrymore show. Several days of rehearsal and instruction, and then a long day of filming ended on the cutting room floor.

Links with the Society for International Folk Dancing. Jill Bransby was Chairman of the Society from 1991 to 1995 and Claire Steeley has run the Society's shop for the last 12 years. The leader of the Society's band, Martin Butler, came to international music through Cloudburst and Rainmakers.

Anniversary year. Members wanted to celebrate their enjoyment of dancing over 30 years by doing something for others less fortunate than themselves. A quiz night held on 20 May, organised by Julie Brix and her team, and in memory of former member Adrian Barter, raised some £600 for our local hospice.




Peter, our Chairman, made comments on our busy year and thanked our small, hard-





Mr Waite, who became president of the Eisteddfod last year, arrived early yesterday, meeting hundreds of people on the second day of the festival before taking centre stage in the evening's welcoming ceremony.

Made famous through his experiences in Beirut where he was held hostage after travelling as an envoy of the Archbishop of Canterbury, Mr Waite works tirelessly campaigning for peace and reconciliation.

"We don't see the full glory of other nations' cultures and the eisteddfod is a chance for everyone to come together. It always amazes me to see the many different backgrounds and cultures, yet it is also a very local event."

Mr Waite nominated the Llangollen International Musical Eisteddfod for the 2004 Nobel Peace Prize.

He said music has the power to heal and events such as the eisteddfod have a role in fostering understanding between people from different cultures.

And Mr Waite was presented with a special stick by craftsman Bob Bond of Mynydd Isa, near Mold.

Mr Bond, who hand carves traditional gifts, recalled last year's eisteddfod where he met Mr

"He came over to my stall admiring the sticks I had made and actually bought one," said Mr Bond. "Mr Waite was very complimentary about my hobby and I started to think about a unique stick I could make for him."

It took months of hard work for Mr Bond to come up with the masterpiece for Mr Waite, which was presented to him yesterday.

The stick, made from a cow horn and black hazle-wood, depicts world peace with two hands clasping together in front of the globe of the world on the stick's handle.

Mr Waite said: "This will be my president's stick from now on. I will use it this evening when I am introducing all the people on the stage."

Mr Waite added: "I am a great supporter of craft work and this is a great example of that.

"Promoting local businesses, international understanding, good peace and good relations, is what the festival is all about."


Having visited the event last year, Miss Durinski said she was glad to be back.

"I am very excited about our performances," she said. "We travelled two days on the coach to get here and now we are here, I just can't





An important part of this break was the opportunity to thank Jill for being our President, planning programmes for dances, parties and displays, teaching us on most Friday evenings and generally working hard on behalf of the club.

January and February were quiet months – no outside activities. However some of us met at the Chinese Restaurant, Heart to Heart, in Letchworth on 27th January for a meal and an opportunity for conversation before going on to dance at St. Michael's Hall.

The club met regularly during the next six months but no special events were organised.

Jill, Peter, Claire and Geoff went to the International Eisteddfod at Llangollen at the end of July to see the folk dancing and folk music competitions. They enjoyed their short holiday there even though not so many teams from abroad took part this year. The standard of performance was high.

An end-of-term party was held on July 21st. Not many members were present because several had already gone on holiday. Those who were there had a good time dancing to Cloudburst Band.

Despite wet weather two Garden Evenings were held during August at Julie's and Sheila's. This hospitality is much appreciated by members as valuable social time.

The new term began on Friday, 7th September.

There was no meeting of the club on September 21st as the hall was not available to us. Jill was teaching international dances at the Friday Folk English Dancing Club in St. Albans that night so several Rainmakers went there to support Jill and partner the English dancers.

"Molly's Story" was the title of a concert arranged by Belinda to raise funds for the charity Children in Crisis. It took place on Saturday 29th September at the Queen Mother Theatre in Hitchin. Eight Rainmakers gave a dancing display and Graham recited a monologue.

"Dance Around the World" is an annual event held over two days, October 13th and 14th at Cecil Sharpe House. Numerous dance clubs give displays and workshops of dances literally from all round world from 10:00 a.m. to 11:00 p.m. Maria, Jill and Belinda were part of a team that gave a play of Appalachian clogging on Saturday this year.

Once again our Anniversary came round. The 31st celebration was a much more modest dance than last year's. Nevertheless 35 of us enjoyed a jolly time at St. Michael's Hall with a programme of Rainmakers own choice of dances played by Cloudburst Band in festive mood.

I'd like to thank all the people who have given me contributions for the scrapbook, particularly photographs and information about events that I have not been able to attend in person.

So ends another year. To quote the hymn "the dance goes on", so "Keep Dancing" Rainmakers.
