



#### **Roy Bowtell**



Roy Bowtell died of liver cancer on April 9<sup>th</sup>, aged 80. Those members, who are even older than I am, will remember Roy dancing in the early SIFD days, especially with the YHA. I first met Roy in May, 1976 when I moved from Cambridge to North Hertfordshire and joined the Staplers English Dance Club in Hitchin. By coincidence, Roy and Renee (his ex-wife) and Gordon and Dalphine Stacey, had also joined the Staplers that May so it was then that we discovered we were all keen International Folk Dancers. We were the founder members of Rainmakers, formed in September 1976.





Roy was a very enthusiastic and skilled dancer who contributed to the Rainmakers in many ways. He served on committees, helped to raise funds with our jumble sales and was always on hand as a loyal member of our club. He took part in so many displays – I looked in my photo albums to find a suitable picture of Roy for this article and in every album, until

very recently, there is a picture of Roy dancing his heart out. When we went out on a day of dance, or to a festival, or wherever with Roy, we always had fun.

When Roy was unable to dance any more he dropped out of the dance scene, including English dancing – he was a keen member of the Staplers Club, as well as

the Roundabouters in Stevenage. This withdrawal was because he couldn't bear to watch dancing, or



even M.C., as he found it too painful not to be able to join in. I met up with him again recently at a play-reading group and also a singing group. In the latter he was singing his heart out – just as he danced. I will miss him but I will remember the good times – and we did have lots of those. I am thankful for Roy's friendship, fun, and zest for life.





#### **RAINMAKERS' YEAR - November 2008 - November 2009**

Recently the Rainmakers Folk Dance Group celebrated its 33<sup>rd</sup> anniversary on October 16<sup>th</sup>. Looking back it seems amazing that our club could have lasted so long. There have been highs and lows in our fortunes relative to membership numbers attending on a Friday evening for various understandable reasons. The Chairman had no official committee to help him but, with the hard work of some members, the club was kept going from 2007 to 2008.

A new committee was formed at the last AGM on November 28<sup>th</sup> 2008. With renewed zest they forged ahead. Jill was still our pivotal dancing leader but some Friday meetings were led by Alan, Maria, Graham and Roger. Other tasks were shared around. Patti became the Treasurer.

Our 32<sup>nd</sup> Anniversary Dance was held in the Parish Hall, Letchworth on 14<sup>th</sup> November 2008. Twenty-two people, including a party from Woodvale and a few other visitors, enjoyed a very jolly evening. Cloudburst Band played splendidly.

The intervening weeks were normal club evenings, sometimes with as few as eight people present but all most enjoyable thanks to the preparation and skill of different callers.

Graham, one of these experienced Rainmakers, led the SIFD's Christmas Dance at Cecil Sharp House on December 7<sup>th</sup> 2008.

Our own Christmas Party was held in Letchworth on Friday, 19<sup>th</sup> December.

The new term began at Rainmakers on Friday, 9th January 2009.

There was a quiet period at the club with no Saturday Day Courses or visiting teachers on a Friday evening or demonstrations taking place. Jill and Peter were away for two holidays. A greetings card to the Rainmakers arrives from them every time they are away. When in France they hoped to see some dancing but were disappointed, but the Zulus they watched when in South Africa in February gave Jill some ideas. She said "Tell Roger to order some spears for Rainmakers!"

On March 2<sup>nd</sup> Jill was MC at Cecil Sharp House for the SIFD's regular monthly dance. Her varied programme attracted a good number of dancers who enjoyed a very lively evening.

Pictures of a team of Rainmakers dancing in Letchworth appeared in a local magazine during March. We hoped some new members might be recruited.

During the Summer I did not hear that any Rainmakers attended major Folk Festivals in Britain which is unusual. Jill and Peter, in Portugal in June, watched a local festival parade called a "Marche Populaire". It started at 10.30pm and ended at 12.30am. Many teams carrying banners marched about making patterns. The evening ended with everyone joining in a dance very like Fackel Dans.

"Rhythms of the World" took place in the Priory Park, Hitchin on Saturday and Sunday July 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> 2009. It was a hot, sunny day. Huge crowds of people converged on to the park to listen to many bands and watch displays of dancing. Among them, wearing their red and black French costumes, were a team of Rainmakers led by Jill. Martin and Wendy played for their energetic demonstration of ten dances.

We held our end-of-term party at Letchworth on Friday, July 24<sup>th</sup> 2009. There was a large attendance.

A request came from Freeman House Residential Care Home in Letchworth for a half-hour display on a Sunday afternoon. Mark, Patti, Roger, Graham, Jill, Peter and Maria were free on Sunday

20<sup>th</sup> September and agreed to do this. It was a hot day and the four men and three women had to work very hard, swapping partners and dancing on a carpet. However the residents showed their appreciation by clapping along with the music, particularly for Appenzeller Klatswalzer. One old lady joined in dancing Walenki. In the end the programme took over an hour.

On Friday, September 25<sup>th</sup>, Dalila Heath came from the SIFD to teach a selection of Armenian dances. She mainly chose graceful, elegant dances that looked deceptively easy but were not. I saw some worried, puzzled faces at times. She is a beautiful dancer so her movements gave the Rainmakers an excellent example of style, particularly for hand and arm positions.

Our 33<sup>rd</sup> Anniversary Dance on October 16<sup>th</sup> 2009 was a great occasion. Held at St Michael's Parish Hall as in recent years, it was an ideal venue for 26 dancers, including six visitors. We were especially pleased to see Janet and Frank both dancing with us again and John Walford, who comes all the way from Reading. The other visitors also joined in enthusiastically. Cloudburst Band, consisting of Martin, Hazel, Wendy, Adrian and Narin played for us all evening and were superb. They really have a feel for the mood and style of each dance from many countries. Sometimes they got up and danced whilst playing and Martin and Narin sang.

The kitchen was out of action as it is being refurbished, thus making the laying out of refreshments by Maria and Patti, very hard work. Maria had made a most delicious fruit cake as a birthday cake for the club. Wafts of alcohol rose from it as it was cut!

Most unfortunately Jill had injured her leg badly in Portugal when on holiday the week before. She was obviously in great pain so was unable to dance as much as she wished but gamely kept the atmosphere of the evening going with a swing.

The most recent event in which Rainmakers were involved was the annual Dance Around the World at Cecil Sharp House on the weekend of October 24<sup>th</sup> and 25<sup>th</sup> 2009. Maria, Belinda and Wendy danced with an Appalachian clogging team who were one of fifty different teams giving displays. A few of us who had gone to watch were proud to see "our girls" placed in the front as best dancers. It was also very pleasing to see Graham dancing with an excellent group from Central London.

Graham was also MC for the SIFD's monthly dance at Cecil Sharp House on November 1st.

As a break from being in the audience in Kennedy at Dance Around the World, one could also go downstairs and join in various workshops for musicians and dancers. On the Sunday evening Jill called for an International Folk Dance in Kennedy. Eighty people, many of them new faces to the SIFD, were on the floor most of the time. It was a very successful dance.

We are truly sorry that Jill is hurt and hope that expert treatment will lead to a full recovery before too long.

Despite worries at the beginning of the year, our club remains as thriving and active as ever.

#### Treasurer's report 6.1 Treasurer's Report Richard was unfortunately unable to attend the AGM, so sent the following written report which was read out: -Please accept my apologies for not being here tonight to present the accounts, the first time I have ever missed an AGM of any club whilst I have been their Treasurer. When the date was fixed I was accidentally left out of being advised, a consequence of their being no There was a Christmas card collection of £28.30 last year. I believe that the Chairman had nominated a charity for the money to be sent to, but again, due to the lack of a Committee, this was overlooked. I suggest the new Committee etc deals with this donation and put it in next year's accounts. The Club has banked with the Clydesdale Bank in Milton Keynes for the last 3 years since the Yorkshire Bank in Stevenage closed down. Clydesdale and Yorkshire Banks are part of National Australian Bank Group. There was a choice between being charged by a local bank to pay in and remain with the Yorkshire Bank but in Luton or having free paying-in facilities with the Post Office for Clydesdale Bank. So the Committee in September 2005 agreed to switch to Clydesdale Bank, made easier for me as it was also my own bank. However, relations over my business banking have deteriorated recently and they are being most unreasonable and unhelpful that I will be switching my own accounts from them early in the New Year. In addition two credits paid in at the Post Office went astray. One, a cash credit, took 6 weeks to appear on our account. There was no apology nor was the interest paid adjusted, to give us 6 weeks interest on the amount paid in. The second was for paying-in a cheque of mine which I had exchanged for cash and that credit and my personal cheque have never yet appeared on the respective statements, it is evidently apparent that the club should no longer trust either the paying-in facilities provided by the Post Office for Clydesdale Bank nor the service given by Clydesdale Bank itself. I strongly recommend that the club, with immediate effect, transfers its account away from the Clydesdale Bank. A lot of the main banks do not offer interest on their club chequebook accounts. However, I believe that some Building Societies may do. I will leave the AGM or the new Committee to decide which option to follow. Please remember that banks require the minutes to be noted accordingly. I am sorry that both my leg injury and work commitments have prevented me from attending very much this year as I have missed the dancing very much. In view of this I regret that I must tender my resignation as the club's treasurer, after many years loyal service over 2 spells. I wish the club all the best in finding a replacement treasurer and, hopefully a new committee. They will all have my full support and I will retain my membership in the New Year. I have handed the books etc to Roger. He and Maria are signatories on the Clydesdale Bank account so they will be able to sort out the transfer. I sincerely hope to be able to attend more often next year, work commitments permitting. Certainly my leg needs as much exercise as possible and more dancing in the last couple of weeks has not been as painful as previously. As soon as time allows I will be happy to offer

I regret that work commitments for the first 2 weeks of December and a promise to take Mum to the Yetties' Christmas Concert in Didcot on 19 December means that I will be the first to wish everyone at the club a very merry Christmas and a prosperous and healthy New Year. #### 6.2 Accounts A couple of typographical corrections were made: -On the Income sheet, "Excess of income over expenditure" was corrected to "Excess of expenditure over income" On the Balance sheet, the right hand column title "2006/2008" was corrected to "2007/2008" Roger explained that he had looked through the chequebook, and could not see any evidence that the "£71.30 Donations not made" entry on the Balance sheet for 2006/2007 had been paid, probably due to the lack of committee meetings where this would have been flagged up. Therefore the £28.30 in this row for 2007/2008 should be increased to £99.60. Also the £54 paid to the Garden House Hospice (see Matters Arising above) should have been included in the 2006/2007 entry. Roger/ Roger suggested, and it was agreed, that the £99.60 owing to the Garden House Hospice Maria should be rounded up to £100, and paid as soon as possible With these corrections, it was asked what the Independent Examiner audits – the accounts Committee as presented to the club at the AGM or the books. The committee agreed to look into this. This issue gave rise to a discussion about the way the amount of money the club has was displayed on the Balance sheet. It was thought it would be more transparent if known debts at the end of the financial year, in this case "Donations not made", were moved further up the balance sheet and subtracted from the "Cash in Hand" and "Bank" summation. This would then give the overall amount the club had, including the Working Capital and the Equipment Fund. Roger agreed to recast the balance sheet in this form, with the corrections to the "Donations not made" as given above. A vote of thanks for Richard, who is retiring as Treasurer after 2 long stints at the job, was proposed by Graham, seconded by Jill, and carried unanimously. Jill had bought a card to thank Richard for all of his hard work, and it was agreed to buy him a present. 8 **Appointment of Independent Examiner** It was suggested that we might look for a different independent examiner, possibly within the club as the SIFD has a member examining their accounts. Henry volunteered and this was approved unanimously. If Henry was unable to serve, Peter agreed to be a substitute, a course of action approved by the meeting. Thanks were recorded to Bill Thorne for examining this years accounts. 7 Subscriptions Roger reported that the hall hire had been increased from £9 per hour to £12 per hour. On the old rate, 12 paying members at £1.50 covered the hall hire. It was suggested that the weekly subscription was raised to £2, so 12 paying members would still cover the hall hire. This was proposed by Roger, seconded by Graham, and unanimously accepted by the meeting apart from Isobel, who abstained. It was commented that the Staplers' weekly subscription has been £2 for a number of years. It was recommended that the annual subscription should remain unchanged. This was accepted by the meeting. 9 **Election of new Committee** Roger said that, constitutionally, the club was required to have a committee, but the committee need meet very infrequently. Practically, the two essential functions were overall coordination (chairman role) and control of the money (treasurer role). Tasks could be delegated to non-committee members. 




